SE TX OSHA Five Things to Know (October 2022)

An overview of what is happening in regards to safety in SE Texas and OSHA



1 – October 2022 Preliminary Fatalities/Catastrophes* (10)

Construction

- NAICS 238910 Company drilling pier holes with 30" auger and lost sight of the helper who was found 6'-7' inside the hole.
- NAICS 237110 Employee was in a trench to tie in waterlines when a side of the trench collapsed.
- NAICS 238320 Employee was painting in a residence and a shotgun the owner had propped against the wall fell and discharged.
- **NIACS 2387910** Employee was in an excavation on a compactor when the excavation collapsed pinning him against the machine.

General Industry

- NAICS 812930 Owner went on top of roof to tell a construction worker to move their car and fell through the roof.
- NAICS 488510 A driver struck the back of a box truck occupied by an employee in a construction work zone.
- NAICS 561730 Employee was on driver's side of end dump truck trailer when it tilted and crushed him.
- NAICS 721110 Eleven 100 lb. boxes of glass shower doors fell on an employee.
- NAICS 488320 Employee struck by rail car during switching operations.
- NAICS 423830 Employee finished doing a thermal spray application and lost consciousness and later died.

4 – October 2022 Preliminary Serious Incident Reports (37 Reports)

Construction (11 Reports) – There were five falls including two instances of a fall from a rooftop access ladder, a vehicle, 13' from installed decking, and off the roof of a two story house. There were three caught between cases involving a handrail and a dredge screen, a truck on stands pushed over by a tractor that lunged forward, and a mold and a press brake. There were two struck by injuries, one when a beam rolled while being held up by a crane and the other when I-beams shifted when they were being set down with a forklift. There was one electrical incident involving an arc flash when a part was removed from an energized transformer.

General Industry (26 Reports) — There were fourteen caught between incidents involving pole being lifted into a pole cradle, a leg hanging off the side of a stand-up reach truck, a forklift and a dumpster, a bolster and a chain, a hammer mill, a glove caught in a tube expander, a part flying out of a grinder, rolling pipes, a rolling gate, a PIT and a pole, the fold area of a dock plate, a lift cable and a truck, a gloved hand in a lifting strap/lifting hook on an overhead crane, and a crane hook that rotated while holding the safety latch. Four falls occurred while climbing a ladder on a truck, stairs on a deck, a trip over walkie-rider and was then struck by another one, and a scaffold. Four struck by events involving a sliding pipe clamp, fabric cutting machine which fell, a stand up forklift when they stepped off while it was moving, and a forklift driven off a dock. Fout other incidents involved hot water burns while inspecting an ash system, a flash fire while connecting a gas line, sulfuric acid exposure in waste water treatment facility, and an exposure to aniline while disconnecting a hose.
